Preface

Realizing the urgent need for nurturing peace and harmony in the society, a National Peace Convention was organized by the Committee for Peace and Conflict Resolution/Prevention of Rotary District 3040 in 2015 in Indore. Besides members of the Rotary International, many individuals from different professions, including teachers and principals of many schools participated in the first National Peace Convention. At the end of the convention it was unanimously decided to launch a National Peace Movement. Fr. Varghese Alengaden was elected as the President of the National Peace Movement.

National Peace Movement consists of citizens from different parts of India and from different professions. Students and teachers also play key role in the National Peace Movement. National Peace Movement, in collaboration with Universal Solidarity Movement Indore, Rotary International and other organizations working for peace, has been organizing National Peace Convention every year since 2015. The second National Peace Convention was organized at Dimapur, Nagaland in 2016, the third convention in Goa in 2017 and the

fourth one in Kochi in 2018. The fourth convention has decided to form state level units of National Peace Movement and organize state level conventions prior to the National Convention.

The National Peace Convention starts every year on 30th January, the death anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi, by paying tributes to Gandhiji and it is concluded on February 1. Throughout the convention the contribution of Gandhiji for peace is highlighted. One of the objectives of the Peace Convention is to disseminate the relevance of Gandhiji and his methods based on non-violence and forgiveness for conflict resolution and prevention.

Kochi Peace Declaration

When peace and harmony are disturbed and threatened in many parts of the world, particularly in our country, India, we, 372 delegates from 15 states of India, who are keen to nurture and promote peace and reconciliation, participated in the fourth National Peace Convention held from January 30th to February 1, 2018 at IMA House (Indian Medical Association) Kochi. We got



energized and renewed our commitment to become peace makers. The convention was organized by National Peace Movement in collaboration with Rotary International Districts 3040 and 3201, Peace Channel Nagaland, Universal Solidarity Movement Indore, People's Movement for Peace Kannur, Chetana Music College, Trichur, and Trend Setters, New Delhi. The Local Organizing Committee under the vibrant leadership of Dr. Vincent Kundukulam in perfect coordination with Rtn. Varghese Alengadan, the President of National Peace Movement, played a prominent role in making the convention fruitful and a spiritual experience. Participation and sharing by more than 50 students from different schools and colleges reflected the young India's earnest desire to uphold India's core civilizational value, 'Vasudaiva Kudumbakam'.

Interaction with persons belonging to different states, religions, cultures and professions and



exchanging views helped the participants to understand the peace building process. The fact that all participants paid towards the expenses of the convention, besides meeting the cost of their travel and accommodation shows their commitment to peace building.

Erudite and inspiring sharing by persons from various fields on different aspects of peace helped the participants to expand the horizon of their understanding of peace. Prominent among the speakers are 1) Dr. V. P. The panellists, Dr. Scaria Kallor, a peace activist from Kannur, Dr. C P Anto, founder of Peace Channel, Nagaland, Ashish Franklin, the founder of 'Aspire to Inspire' youth organization and Dr. Jerry Joseph Pulickan, founder of 'Home for Hope' for providing free palliative care inspired the participants with their stories of making a difference. The innovative ideas shared by the student speakers delighted and enriched the participants.

Peace meditation guided by Dr. Paul Poovathinkal, an expert in Carnatic music, enabled the participants to experience peace within them at the beginning of the day.

Our Significant Learning

- In order to become a peace maker one has to experience peace within himself or herself.
- Taking religion to politics and streets is detrimental to peace.
- Only by caring, sharing and making sacrifices one can contribute to nation building:



- mere slogan shouting is not patriotism.
- Liberty, equality, fraternity, sharing and communion are the core tribal values and they can definitely contribute to peace building.
- Religion is being used to keep the poor embroiled in a web of poverty and the ever increasing inequalities between the rich and the poor is a threat to peace and harmony. We should be ashamed of the phenomenon of increasing number of billionaires.
- When we rush after prosperity with greed we actually become poor.
- Respecting other religions by understanding them and empathizing with them is essential for peace.
- Gandhi bashing and multi-pronged attack on Mahatma Gandhi have become a fashion today in India; but by bringing back Gandhiji to the centre stage peace can be established not only in India but also in the world.
- "Transformative non-violence" is an excellent means for conflict resolution and prevention. The state should be non-violent in dealing with conflicts.
- Spirituality is seeing God in every human being and serving him/her.
- Education is to be made gender sensitive in order to make gender equality a reality.
- Peace is at present under siege not only in our country, but all over the world because human hearts are being walled up and the biggest enemy of peace is the differentiation between "we" and "they".

- Wasting the resources is violence against nature and human beings.
- Instrumentation and manipulation of the media are being used today to fight wars; hence journalists have a great responsibility to expose the facts with details.

Fruits of the Convention

We, the participants reflected and discussed in state-wise groups about the ways and

means for nurturing peace and arrived at the following action plan and suggestions to be implemented at the local and the national levels.

a) Action Plan:

 State level peace conventions will be organized prior to the National Peace Convention. State Level committees will be formed for organizing the same.



- Programmes for promoting peace will be organized at the local level in collaboration with likeminded groups, especially the Rotary clubs.
- Peace clubs will be formed in schools and colleges for promoting peace.
- Gandhian values and principles will be disseminated among the students through various co-curricular activities.
 2nd October and January 30th will be observed as peace day with special programmes on Mahatma Gandhi.
- Peace rallies will be organized by the participants in their respective locations, involving other like-minded organizations.
- One minute silence will be observed during the school assembly for world peace.
- In order to promote harmony among the followers of different religions, Inter-religious prayer with readings from different sacred scriptures will be conducted; quotations from all scriptures will be exhibited on the walls of



institutions.

- For promoting the values of the Indian constitution posters of the preamble will be put up in prominent places of the institutions and public places.
- Conflict resolution skills will be imparted to the students, teachers and the youth through appropriate sessions/trainings.
- Students and teachers will be participating in the National Peace Convention.

Suggestions

Kochi

- Use social media for promoting peace and sharing information about peace activities undertaken at the local and national levels.
- Make an appeal to the government to introduce peace education in the curriculum of the educational institutions and form a Ministry for Peace at the centre.
- Introduce study of all religions as part of value education in view of appreciating the universal values of all religions.
- Observe a 'Constitution Day' for disseminating the values of the Indian constitution, particularly pluralism, justice, liberty, equality and fraternity.
- Provide media education to the youth for viewing the media critically.

We, are grateful to all those who have contributed to make the 4th National Peace Convention a great opportunity for learning more about peace and experiencing peace and harmony.

Welcome to Kochi, A Place of Harmony

onducting Peace Convention 2018 at Kochi is appropriate for many reasons. This is the place of harmony where you can find the legacy of Jainism, Buddhism, Hinduism, Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Let me recall your memory: we are not very far from Kalady (may be 30 km), the birth place of Jagadguru Sri Sankaracharya, not even 10 kilometers to reach Fort Kochi, one of the ancient Jewish settlements in India. The first communities of Christianity and Islam in India were at Kodungallur, around 35 kilometers from here. And this is the land of Sri Narayanaguru, Mahatma Ayyamkali and many other noble souls, whom the luminaries of 20th century like Swami

It is true that there had been episodes of violence in the history of India from the time immemorial as in the case of any other country. But immediately after such unfortunate episodes there were also attempts to re-establish peace and harmony. Peace Pilgrimage

PEACE MOVEMENT and successfully organized peace conventions in Dimapur (Nagaland), Goa and now in Kochi, Kerala.

Daring to be different at all levels led by the 'possibility thinking' proved that we could organize great events without having political leaders and ministers as speakers, make all participants pay for their registration and accommodation as part of their commitment for peace. Support of renowned speakers who hold responsible

positions affirmed our conviction. We also refuse to bring celebrities who demand appearance fee to this programme. We firmly believe that volunteerism with the passion for mission like our freedom fighters are needed to rebuild the nation with peace and values enshrined in our Constitution. The culture of gathering crowds with free food and free travel will not bear any lasting fruit.

I welcome all of you who have made a choice to be here. You have left your responsibilities and travelled many days from distant places like Nagaland, Odissa, UP and Uttarakahnd. Large number of you have come from M.P., Maharashatra and T.N.

A special word of appreciation to the young students from schools and colleges who opted to be here. Your participation gives us hope because it is



you, the youth, who will have to rebuild this country and free from our Motherland from the corrupt and divisive forces. India is young with more than half of its population below 25 years of age. Youth shall stand up and speak! Youth shall act, act here and NOW!

All of you have come for a sacred mission. I consider it a special pilgrimage, PEACE PILGRIMAGE. I say this because there are those who have come for the 4th time and 3rd time for the Convention from different states. I salute you for your commitment!

Before concluding I want to urge all of you to take charge NOW! We shall not leave peacemaking to politicians and governments! We shall not wait for God to bring peace because each one of us is an incarnation of God and we carry God within us! Let peace come forth from each one of us; in our thoughts, words and actions.

Each one should believe that nothing is impossible! The more the problems, the greater should be our determination; the more the darkness, the greater the need for us to be the light; the more the indifference, the greater should be our sensitivity.

hen you pray to God, you say, "I should have cancer and I should come out of cancer". When you have cancer you learn to realize that you are a human being. The patients teach us what human life is.

When your life is at stake then you will have no ego. When there is a flood nobody thinks of religion but saving lives. Your next breath is in the hands of somebody. If you can think that your life is at stake then you will be a better person to live on earth.

An IAS Officer who was his patient told him when he gave her on the festival of Vishu one rupee coin as a part of the ritual on the that feast, "If I had the intuition about the life that I am experiencing now I would have done differently as an IAS officer. If I get a second chance I would definitely do better. There is no use of repenting over the lost opportunities. We will not be able to bring back the lost opportunities. This moment is the time to help others. "If you are not able to do it today you have lost that chance". In life we get enough chances to help others and we have to make use of them. If our life is to be meaningful, it should be useful to others. We must be able to say,

"I don't want kingdom, heaven, reincarnation

I should be able to reduce the pain of all creatures"

Poverty of Prosperity

hile delivering her speech on the topic, 'Poverty of Prosperity' she said, "A tendency that is found in India is to keep poor people poor always in order keep some people always rich. Religion is being used to keep poor embroiled in the web of poverty. The youth of this country and religion are being used by the political parties to achieve their divisive goals. Why should we protect our Gods and religion? In fact, God has to protect us. Because of mixing religion with politics certain groups are dividing the people of this country. Against this backdrop a person who advices us to be inclusive may be physically eliminated and later his/her ideology could be buried.

What is prosperity? When you rush after prosperity you are poor. Those who have enough have the responsibility to share with others and when you share with others you become rich and that is real prosperity."

We have forgotten the talisman of Mahatma

Gandhi and that is the cause for many of our problems. "I will give you a talisman. Whenever you are in doubt, or when the self becomes too much with you, apply the following test. Recall the face of the poorest and the weakest man [woman] whom you may have seen, and ask yourself, if the step you contemplate is going to be of any use to him [her]. Will he [she] gain anything by it? Will it restore him [her] to a control over his [her] own life and destiny? In other words, will it lead to swaraj [freedom] for the hungry and spiritually starving millions? Then you will find your doubts and your self melt away."

Unfortunately, the system in which we live today, each one is running in competition with the other. We have forgotten that we belonged to a civilization where all ate together, shared with each other and lived together in harmony. We have to go back to Gandhian economy and Gandhian spirituality.

Peace is Our Responsibility

Peace is at present under siege not only in our country, but all over the world. Countries want to build walls around them. The hearts are being walled up, space and everything becomes "mine" and not "ours". This is the biggest challenge today. We are actually becoming islands. This tendency towards isolation is very dangerous for peace.

In our present we don't have examples. Hence we have to go back to Bapu. Bapu has taught us to use anger positively for reforming the persons who are responsible for injustice. For example when cow vigilantes indulge in violence we can approach court through Public Interest Litigation. We have to respond to injustice, but without resorting to violence. Not responding to injustice is irresponsibility.

We have to find out a way of life by which we understand the other, why he or she behaves in a particular way. If we understand that no two people are going to be identical then we are going to respect differences. Accepting and respecting difference are essential for peace and that is our responsibility.

Greed and wasteful ways are violence against nature and contribute to global warming. We have a great responsibility to prevent the catastrophe due to global warming by liberating ourselves from greed and avoiding wasteful ways. Icons like Bapu are mirrors which reflect our souls. There is no use of worshiping them. We have to follow the way they have shown us. We have to appeal to the tiny goodness hidden in every person.

Today science can treat all kinds of diseases. Plague could be controlled in Surat within 15 days. But there is no medicine by which we can make a dishonest man honest. Only spirituality can do it. So

long as a dog is hungry in my country my spirituality compels me to feed it. For me spirituality means no hunger in the world and no violence in the society.



Moving beyond Identity for Peace and Universal Solidarity



Rotary's Role in Building International Peace

he fourth Objective of Rotary International is promoting peace. Rotary works with 7 universities in the world for conducting short and long term courses in peace building. Rotary peace fellowship is made available to those who attend the courses.

Many Rotary districts around the world now allocate from their District Designated Funds thousands of dollars to support a Rotary World Peace Scholar for study at one of the seven Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution.

Rotary Peace Fellows are leaders promoting national and international cooperation, peace, and the successful resolution of conflict throughout their lives, in their careers, and through service activities. Alumni work in a variety of areas, including grassroots and local nongovernmental organizations, national governments, the military, law enforcement, and bilateral and international organizations such as the United Nations, World Bank, International Organization for Migration, and Organization of American States.

Through its service projects, peace fellowships, and scholarships, Rotary members are taking action to address the underlining causes of conflict, including poverty, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources. For example Rotary members founded the People for People Foundation, which has helped 10,000 families afford food, clothing, rent, utilities, medications and other necessities.





Tribal Values in Building Civilization of Love

he core tribal values are Justice, Equality and Fraternity which are enshrined in the Indian Constitution. The only people who truly practice these values are the tribals. It can be seen in all aspects of their lives. People dance and sing together interconnected as a chain and any one can initiate the dance. All of them sit in a circle under a tree for meeting. In hunting and fishing everyone participates and everybody gets equal share including the dog. There is no tribal beggar in the whole of Chhota Nagpur.

The mother of all these human values is the communitarian life. A child is named by the community elders. Finding a bride is the responsibility of the community. Performing death rites is the responsibility of the entire community.

They have an inherent tendency to share with others. Wealth is to be shared and used and not to be hoarded. Tribal people live in the present and not in the future and hence there is no hoarding. This is the reason for contentment among the tribals. Their economy is need based and not greed based. They are the biggest protector of ecology. They use the natural resources without damaging nature.

Respect for women is a core value for the tribals. A Girl has the right to accept or reject the boy. There is no demand for dowry. Parents are equally concerned about the welfare of their daughters.

These values are disappearing due to detribalization. The modern economy is based on plundering.

'Gender Equality for a Peaceful Society'

Although stringent laws have been put in place in India against atrocities on women, they have not changed the everyday realities of women. One third of women in India experience violence. 21 women die every day due to dowry related violence. It is because women are not able to overcome gender barriers. Dalit women and women of minorities face double discrimination.

While the incidence like Nirbhaya shook the 'public conscience' of this country and we saw a huge uproar of women and men on the streets of Indian capital resulting in the amendments of criminal law, it did not change the everyday reality of Indian women. They are abused and harassed inside their own houses, at workplaces, in the schools and universities, on the streets and even on cyberspace. While social media has given a space for women to speak out and express their opinions, the

same old patriarchal notions continue to infect these spaces. Women are trolled and given rape threats with total impunity.

While we are battling for our minimum civil and political rights, the demand for the equal economic and social rights for women is missing. The equal inheritance rights are still a mirage in our country. While some personal laws have recognized women as equal holders of inheritance rights, there are others, which failed to reach that mark.

Lack of sufficient participation of women in politics and in public life is the main cause for the continued violence against women. Women's reservation bill is languishing in the parliament. Making education gender sensitive and providing women equal opportunities for education is the best means to overcome gender inequalities.


Religious Pluralism, Bedrock of Indian Secularism

Our aim is to make the decade's long tradition of violence and political killings in Kannur as a story of the past and to lay the foundation for a new Kannur, built upon peace and harmony and we too join our hands and hearts with the millions of Indians who await the gift of peace.

- To mobilize individuals from various walks of life as associate members of the movement, to assist and mobilize public support for Peace & Development.

Only qualification we need is a willingness to serve along with faith, hope and love.







Mr. Ashish Franklin Tirkey

Ashish Franklin, a cancer survivor, is the founder of 'Aspire to Inspire', an organization dedicated to the empowerment of youth. He transformed not only his life but also the life of many youth through startups.

Aspire to Inspire

s a cancer patient at the prime of his youth negative thoughts were torturing him. He described the miracle happened in him in the following words. "That one word 'human' really changed my life. I reflected upon that word 'human'. Who made this human? When I reflected and saw myself in the mirror, I remembered the word of God that I am created in the image and likeness of God and God is residing in me. These two things really helped me out and I challenged myself that if God is residing in me then why am I thinking that I am moving closer to death. I thought this impossibility can be possible if God is residing in me. I broke down the word "impossible" to 'I Am Possible'".

"It's because I am a human with a life and I have

to help other humans to propagate this life in fullest. This is my mission "to promote life through holistic education and not literacy". After coming back from my treatments I met with friends of my brother and sister, also visited the schools back there in Rourkela. I thought this is the chance to propagate life. We started talking with each other, sharing with each other. Gradually we could build small platforms. Many of them were not good in studies, so I helped them out with their talents. They shared that they don't like to study. So I asked what they loved to do. Some loved sports; some loved cooking, and some loved programming. So we thought of moving ahead with our talent". Thus 'Aspire to Inspire' was born

Music Meditation for Peace



Music is a useful tool in meditation, as it can help one clear his/her mind and stay in the moment. There are different forms of meditation, and different ways to use music with each one. The steps followed in the meditation by Dr. Paul were the following.

- Keep a good posture, keep one's eyes closed, and relax neck and shoulders while one meditates
- Focus breathing: Breath is an essential aspect of any form of meditation. One has to make sure that he/she is breathing deeply and slowly, and that he/she is aware of breath as it enters and leaves the body.
- Listening to music can be seen as a form of meditation. By focusing on it and being aware of oneself and his/her thoughts while one listens, he/she is essentially practicing mindfulness meditation in the process.

Another requirement for promoting peace is to love the environment by keeping away from anything that pollutes the environment and planting trees.



World Peace through Mahatma Gandhi

he historians have not described the struggle for freedom of India as War of Indian Independence but Movement for Independence because there was no call to take up arms and no buildings were bombed down. Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, a young barrister having practised non-violent method to fight against racial discrimination in South Africa, took upon his shoulders the titanic task of getting for India freedom through a collective method of peace and non-violence. Gandhiji proved to the world how conflicts could be resolved through non-violent and peaceful methods, including dialogue.

Nations today mistake security in having number of nuclear warheads and the technology to make superior killing machines such as atom bombs. In reality, national security for a country should be in its political stability, economic strength and diplomatic relations. World peace still remains a concept because the countries that have the power to bring out a change still rely on armament and the use of violence to achieve it. Thus, whatever peace achieved through violence is only temporary; the panacea of non-violence is very rarely used. As a result we see the same issue crop up again more complicated than before. 



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FOURTH NATIONAL PEACE CONVENTION, KOCHI 2018: REPORT OF THE EVALUATION BY THE PARTICIPANTS

Introduction

Out of the 372 participants only 271 filled the evaluation form. 73% response is considered to be very good in any evaluation. However, care must be taken that all participants fill up the evaluation form.

Some participants left just after the first session on the last day without waiting to fill up the forms. The following is the tabulation of the responses to different questions.

Analysis of the Responses

- No one has given the response "poor".
- With regard to organization 96.3% have assessed as either excellent or very good.
- Regarding the resource persons and talks the assessment of 94% of participants is either excellent or very good.
- Food is assessed by 89.7% participants as either excellent or very good.
- 96.4% of the participants have assessed welcome as either excellent or very good.
- Among the different aspects of the convention 'ORGANIZATION' gets the highest percentage of excellence (65%) followed by RESOURCE PERSONS AND TALKS (59%).

Comments/Suggestions

- Use social media to promote peace.
- Increase the duration of the convention to full three days.
- Include more students as speakers.
- Afternoon session shall be devoted for group discussion and use more video clippings.
- Organize state and district level conventions also.
- 6. Start Peace movement in all schools and colleges as a follow up of the Convention.
- 7. There should be more time for question answers.
- 8. Get written copies of the speeches of the speakers and make them available to the participants.

In general the evaluation by the participants is very positive. Many have given positive comments in their evaluation sheet and promised their participation in the next national convention.














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
